Conservation District Ordinance Delayed

The Planning Commission has delayed a decision to adopt Conservation Districts as a local ordinance. Conservation Districts will be discussed at their next meeting on January 13th. Anyone interested in this issue is strongly encouraged to attend the meeting.

This has no direct effect on any portion of our neighborhood. Planning Commission is simply considering if a lighter version of an Architectural Design Control District would be an option in the city.

Update on Martha Jefferson Hospital

Martha Jefferson Hospital is moving forward in the process to select a development partner. Nine responses to the Request for Qualifications were received, and the hospital narrowed the field to three companies. A fourth company has put forward a proposal to simply buy the property. The three companies remain in the game and are ready to move forward, even in the current economic

climate.

According to Steve Bowers, "The hospital has taken a patient approach, which has paid off thus far. We're going to stay the course, now more than ever. While we had hoped to name a development partner by the close of the calendar year, it's a very complex and very important decision. We are working very hard, and continuing to en-

gage Economic Research Associates in Washington as a third-party in the process. Our hope is to name a partner soon after the New Year. It's also worth noting that the hospital is quite appreciative of the collaborative relationship we've developed with MJNA over the course of the last couple of years – and that is not lost on our potential partners."
